CNOOC Wraps Up Work on Exploratory Well in NL Offshore. The China National Offshore Oil Corporation, or CNOOC has finished drilling Pelles—its first exploration well in the Newfoundland offshore.

The company says now that drilling operations are complete, they are plugging and abandoning the well—something they call standard procedure for all exploration wells. Two international publications earlier this year identified the well as one to watch.

Mary Simon, 30th Governor General of Canada

She is bilingual in English and Inuktitut, but not in French — normally a key requirement for Crown

appointments who are expected to conduct their work and communicate in both official languages.



Obituary of Patrick Thomas Gates

GATES, Captain Patrick Thomas Carne, MM, MNI, AFNI: Lewis Lake, March 26, 1944 – August 13, 2021. A genuine man of the seas. A rare gentle intelligent man of ideas, accomplishments, honesty and integrity ... who loved to laugh, was gracious, generous and always cheerful, passed away peacefully in the arms of his cherished wife, Constance Lynn at home, after a long battle with

heart disease, so sad for such a beautiful caring heart.

Youngest son of Reginald Carne Gates and Laura (nee Shelton). Predeceased by his first wife, Diane Drummond (Scott) Gates. Survived by his loving wife, Constance Lynn Hall Gates; sister, Veronica Oliver (Gates) (Rex); brother, Anthony Carne Gates (Anne); his worshipping heartbroken cat, Romeo along with numerous nephews and nieces. One of the greatest gifts he enjoyed in his last few years was the gift of family. His marriage to Lynn gave him three stepchildren who came to love him dearly as he did them. Stepdaughter, Lori Lee Robertson (Keith); stepsons, Ronald Scott Speed and Jonathan Derek Hounsell (Nicole).

Born in Dar Es Salaam Tanganyika, he enjoyed an early schooling in East Africa prior to travelling to London, England in 1957, where he furthered his education. He led an eventful life on the sea, visiting many corners of the globe, eventually becoming Master and commanded a number of vessels. Captain Patrick "Rick" Gates immigrated to Canada in 1978. Working days in Canada were spent both on board ship and in senior management positions with Irving Oil, Kentline and lastly The Atlantic Pilotage Authority. He continued his love of the sea, in particular, sailing his beloved Compass Rose on the Kennebecasis River with his best friend Brian Thorne. He retired in 2009 to start up a new company, Gates Marine Consulting Limited.

His name has recently been put forward to receive The Merchant Navy Medal for Meritorious Conduct. He married Lynn in July 2016, they lived a fairy tale life of love and laughter where they shared/garnered many new friends sprinkled in the precious old while travelling the world, enjoying a love of cooking, fine dining and conversation, all the time sharing these loves (and Patrick's famous bread) with their many friends and family.

Some of Patrick's accomplishments include: Captain of the Polar Duke assisting in rescuing survivors of the John Biscoe in 1985; Provincial Master of Master Mariners, Fundy Division;

Master, Master Mariners of Canada, Maritime Division; National Master of Master Mariners of Canada; Associate Fellow of The Nautical Institute, London England and a member of the International Federation of Shipmasters IFSMA of London.

Eaglestar Marine Holdings announced the appointment of Captain Eezmaira Sazzea binti Shaharuzzaman as the company’s first Malaysian female ship Master.

Captain Eezmaira Sazzea’s first voyage as a Captain began on 13 August 2021 as she took over the command of Seri Bijaksana, a 153,000 cu m LNG carrier.

Captain Eezmaira Sazzea was among the first group of Malaysian women selected to pursue professional maritime training in Akademi Laut

Malaysia (ALAM) when the academy opened its doors to female cadets in 2006. She graduated from ALAM in 2011 with a Diploma in Nautical Studies and has been sailing as an Eaglestar officer for the past 10 years.



Thursday September 9, 2021

The first general meeting after the summer brake took place this evening in person and virtually. As usual (some) members met at the Crow’s Nest while some others were present virtually on Zoom. The Divisional Master Captain Eben March called the meeting to order at 1905 hrs.

The first order of business was to discuss replacement of Captain Zaki (Secretary of NL

Division) who has held this position since 2004. Captain Ray Dalton was the only person to volunteer for this position. Captain Dalton was unanimously accepted by the attending members (in person and by Zoom) as the new Secretary of the NL Division.

Captain Eben March, the Divisional Master indicated that the next Nautical Skills Competition (NSC) is currently scheduled for January 22, 2022. In June a request was made for a volunteer to take on the NSC Coordinator position. Ms Maria Halfyard has been the NSC Coordinator since we started the competition in 2012. Capt. March indicated that a person has volunteered but waiting for confirmation. Capt. March has been interim chairperson of NSC Committee and he said he may have someone to take over this role as well.

It was tentatively agreed that the Christmas party to be held on Friday, December 17th 2021. Capt. March will determine availability at either the Sheraton Hotel or the Delta Hotel and will inform members when a decision has been made.

Capt. March stated that the national committee is examining changing the fee structure for dues for the organization. There is a proposal to have a monthly payment of \$20 or \$25 to be automatically deducted from the bank account (of members) instead of an annual payment. All divisions will need to confirm that they are able to do this. A question was asked if this change was made would it still be possible to make one annual payment as we currently do. The fee structure will be discussed at the national AGM coming up later this month (September 25th).

There is an open session of the national AGM on September 25th @ 1500 and Capt. March suggested that members who would like to participate could gather at the Crow's Nest. Several members thought this was a good idea.
