CCGS Hudson Decommissioning

Our of our divisional members, Capt. Sam Arnold, was the Commanding Officer who brought CCGS Hudson back to Dartmouth from St. John's for decommissioning.



It is appropriate that this occurs during the 60th Anniversary of the Canadian Coast Guard which traces its history back to pre Confederation.

The "Hudson" was an offshore oceanographic and hydrographic survey vessel operated by the Canadian Coast Guard. The ship entered service in 1963 with the Canadian Oceanographic Service, stationed at the Bedford Institute of Oceanography, called CSS *Hudson*. The ship made several significant scientific voyages, among them the first circumnavigation of the Americas in 1970. The ship was transferred to the Canadian Coast Guard in 1996 and decommissioned in 2022 due to non feasible upgrades and issues. A replacement is not scheduled for delivery until 2024–2025.
