The 2023 Nautical Skills Competition Master Mariners of Canada (MMC) NL Division



The 11th annual Nautical Skills Competition (NSC) was hosted by the Master Mariners of Canada (MMC), (N.L. Division), in collaboration with the Fisheries and Marine Institute (MI). The event ran from 1700 to 2030 on Friday, March 3rd, 2023 and continued on Saturday, March 4th, from 0800 to 1700. at the Marine Institute's Ridge Road campus in St. John's, NL. A reception followed at 1830 and then a Gala Awards Dinner at 1930. Both held at the Marine Institute cafeteria.

Using 5 state-of-the-art marine simulators, 4 from MI and 1 from local company Virtual Marine, the competition included 7 challenging exercises (5 simulation based and 2 non-simulation based) designed to test the knowledge and ability of Nautical Science students. The competition looked to promote the maritime sector, encourage team building and professionalism, and foster a safety culture.

The NSC started in 2012, as a way for the Master Mariners of Canada (NL Division) to mentor and reach out to the younger generation of upcoming seafarers. Over the past decade, it has become one of the flagship events in the Division's annual calendar. It has also become a way to engage the maritime industry, locally nationally, and internationally through sponsorship and participation. Industry support helps facilitate the event and enables the MMC to promote leadership, strong work ethic, diversity, and inclusion with any new person entering the nautical field.

"The success and growth of the Nautical Skills Competition, over the last 11 years, can be attributed to the teamwork of the NSC planning committee," said Capt. Eben March, MMC Divisional Master and founding member of the NSC planning committee. "It has been remarkable to watch it expand over the years to where

it is today, and we are focused on introducing it to the national and international level over the next couple of years."

Forty three Nautical Science students demonstrated their skills to veteran master mariners from the Newfoundland and Labrador region. Twenty three Canadian maritime companies supporting the competition, providing opportunities for cadets to interact with the region's most experienced mariners. Ten high school students, 9 from across Newfoundland and Labrador and 1 from Nova Scotia, also participated in the event. Contributing to the Master Mariners of Canada's mandate to promote the marine profession to younger generations.



Captain Jim Thorpe

The 1st place winners of the NSC are presented with a plaque named in honour of Captain Jim Thorpe (R. James Thorpe), who was a member of the Master Mariners of Canada (NL Division) and a valuable mentor to the Marine Institute's Nautical Science cadets. Captain Thorpe's passion for student success was palpable as he proved to be a valuable source of information for the cadet technical reports. He was often found volunteering at the school, sharing memories of his own cadet and sailing experiences with the students. The plaque honours the memory of this lifelong respected and professional mariner.

Captain Jim Thorpe was born in Bridgeport, Connecticut, a son of a sailing family, all of whom were active in the Housatonic Boat Club, the oldest yacht club in the state of Connecticut. An avid Yachtsman, he attended Maine Maritime Academy, where he was involved with sailing and club activities. Jim sailed the world with American Export Isbrandtsen Lines as Deck Officer and Navigation Officer, obtaining a USCG license of Master, any gross tons. He also held a distinction of having served on the NS Savannah, the first and one of the few ever built, commercial nuclear powered ships.

Jim retired to Newfoundland with his family. He collaborated with the Master Mariners of Canada, among other projects. Jim was a mariner of the old school, a community builder, and a loving family man with an active circle of friends. His legacy remains an inspiration to young and seasoned mariners alike. Captain Thorpe passed away in January 2009 in St. John's, NL.

At the first Nautical Skills Competition held in 2012, his wife Dawna Vivian and his son Lydon Thorpe presented the 1st Place Award in his honour.

The Competition

Dynamic Positioning (DP) Exercise. Using multi-purpose support vessel (MSV), participants departed a dock in St. John's harbour and steamed through the Narrows. After a short transit, to Freshwater Bay, the vessel was set up on DP. Using DP, the vessel was moved to a position where the it was to commence a cable lay operation.



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Emergency Management Exercise. Participants were given a situation where they were onboard a tanker and received a Mayday from a vessel in distress. They were operating in ice infested waters and had to transit, to the position of the vessel in distress, as quickly and as safely as possible.













Emergency Towing Exercise. Participants had to maneuver an anchor handling supply vessel alongside a semi-submersible drilling rig, at a berth in Marystown. After connecting a towing bridal, the rig was towed to a deep water site in the bay. A harbour tug was available to assist, as required.







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Seamanship Exercise (five sections).

Participants encoded and decoded messages using the signal flags of the International Code of Signals.

They had to tie a heaving line knot (monkey fist), attach it to a heaving line and throw the heaving line through the center of a life ring.

They had to demonstrate various knots, bends, hitches and splices and the proper use of various mooring line stoppers.

They had to assemble items for working aloft or over the ship's side, rig various purchases and discuss/demonstrate the use of this equipment.

They had to identify various light and shape displays.



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
Search and Rescue Exercise. The exercise was a series of short scenarios where the participants had to demonstrate the core STCW skills demanded of a FRC operator. The participants launched and recovered from a moving ship, searched for and recovered survivors, in the water, to the rescue zone of a ship.



Marine Emergency Duties (Team Relay). Held on the Friday evening before the main competition day on Saturday. It was a timed competition where teams competed in pairs. Marks were based on overall time to complete the tasks, with time penalties being incurred for errors in completing the tasks. Marks received counted towards overall team scores for the competition.

- Part A: Donning a fire suit/ bunker gear.
- Part B: Attach a nozzle to a fire hose /deploy hose.
- Part C: Recover rescue manikin to a safe area.
- Part D: Don an immersion suit and life jackets
- Part E: Throw rescue quoit at a target.
